

Reported Incidents in 2022

The number of Reported Incidents in 2022 has risen beyond pre-covid levels. It has exceeded the number reported each year since 2014 when this analysis began.

The number and causes of incidents are now similar to those of pre-covid years.


The reporting of incidents, together with the sharing of learning from them, helps to promote rowing safety. A greater number of reported incidents is a "good thing".




All Significant Incidents



Causes of Reported Incidents in 2022

In 2022, the number of incidents reported was greater than in previous years. The number caused by Poor lookout on the water was the highest ever, 580 (505 in 2021). This accounted for 40% (44% in 2021) of Significant Incidents. Failure to keep a good lookout on the water was a major factor in 49% (52% in 2021) of incidents.

A large number of reports mentioned that trees and bushes have overgrown the water and are obstructing the view ahead or forcing boats to move towards the middle of the river to avoid them. This reduces the usable width of the river and has contributed to the number of collisions and near misses.

There was a significant increase in:

- Falls and other injuries,
- Antisocial behaviour and
- Equipment failure.

Behaviour

In each of the years, more than 92% of significant incidents could have been avoided by safer behaviour.

Common Behaviour-related Causes of Incidents

The most common behaviour related incidents continue to be:

- Not keeping a good lookout (on land as well as on water)
- Not adhering to the navigation code
- Failure to check equipment
- Antisocial behaviour

In 2022 these accounted for 84% of incidents, compared with 88% in 2021.

There was a considerable increase in the number of incidents caused by Falls and other injuries and Antisocial behaviour.

Near misses are incidents that could have, but did not, cause harm or damage. Near Misses include:

- Near Collisions due to
 - Poor lookout
 - Non-adherence to navigation code
 - Poor steering
- Creating excessive wash
- Badly/illegally moored boats
- Lifejacket or kill-cord incidents
- Boat Inspections at Competitions


Note:

The fatalities in 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020 and one in 2021 were all tragic health-related incidents.



Causes of 2022 Significant Incidents resulting in any time off rowing




Causes of 2022 Incidents resulting in one week or more off rowing

Incidents causing broken bones typically result in many weeks off rowing and work.





Trends in Simple Capsizes



Simple Capsize is a capsize due to a simple technique mistake or competence issue.

Simple Capsize does not include Capsizes where there was an external factor (e.g. weed or collision), injury, failure to check equipment, damage to equipment or equipment failure.

Reports should not be made when doing a capsize drills as the capsize is expected.

Antisocial Behaviour

Antisocial Behaviour

It is disappointing to see that the number of incidents caused by Antisocial behaviour has increased to the highest number ever. The number of incidents in 2022 was 84 (54 in 2021) and 6% (5% in 2021) of Significant Incidents.

Most of the increase in incidents was caused by badly or illegally moored boats and swimmers who deliberately swam close to boats or failed to make themselves conspicuous in the water.

None of these incidents resulted in any harm to people and only 4 resulted in damage to property, I of which was caused by a swan attacking a boat.



Summary

A note from the HRSA

This year has seen an increase in the number of incidents reported. Rowing fosters a no-blame culture with regard to reporting incidents. We welcome reports and recognise and reward those clubs that report the most incidents.

The information gained from incident reports helps us to improve the advice we provide and makes a positive contribution to safety that benefits the whole rowing community.

When reporting an incident, the key thing is to capture all the facts. However some writers take the time to demonstrate their literary skills.

Alas, this year there were no poems, but one sculler eloquently described the rescue of Jess, a young aquatic border collie and the resulting capsize. You can read the story on the next page.

This incident was one of four involving dogs, two were rescues, two were collisions. There were seven incidents involving swans, three collisions and four attacks on rowers.

Please continue to report incidents and please keep a better lookout.

The rescue of Jess, border collie

While sculling downstream approximately 5.5km into my weekly constitutional trundle, I was warned by a fellow club member of a dog in the river ahead of me.

I identified the aquatic creature as a young border collie, but with some odd markings suggesting a not entirely pure breeding of this noble type.

The owner was on the bank, not being of the swimming bent. He was attempting to recall the errant hound but had misplaced the squeaky ball normally used for said purpose. Thus disarmed, the pet (whose name I learned to be Jess) was doggie paddling around in the river getting ever further from her increasingly worried owner.

I cornered the beast betwixt stern and strokeside rigger and backed down, guiding the naughty canine towards her owner. On reaching him, Jess decided that another lap was in order, other scullers having now arrived who were much more interesting than the withdrawal of off lead privileges.

I paddled away and around 50m from the owner, came across the dog, now seemingly enjoying the swim less and less by the second. She attempted to board my Carl Douglas by the stern canvas. A most unwise move in well polished fine furniture.

The dog was by now panicking and thrashing about so I grabbed her by the collar and pulled her into my boat onto my lap. This would have been fine had Jess not knocked my bowside scull out of my hand.

There then followed a slow-motion ballet of lurch to starboard, with water over the saxboard, followed by a quite quick flip back to port as less adjusted position. The resulting shift in balance flipped the boat, with both rescuer and rescued now in the river.

My feet came out of the shoes (brand new pair that outing - now smelling displeasingly of river water) as heel restraints were as required;).

With almost no stream or wind, and a growing crowd (correct collective noun for scullers escapes me) of singles for company, I chose to practise my lifesaving stroke with a hairy dog instead of another person in pyjamas as it was last time I did this (why pyjamas always intrigued me- as did diving for a brick in them). I returned Jess to her relieved owner and then returned to my obediently waiting boat where I declined to wreck the saxboards by beaching over it and so towed it to a suitable mud bank where I got back in.




